Travel tip

Travelling from Pearson International Airport to downtown can be expensive by taxi/limousine (\$53 or \$58, plus tip), but they are usually available. See http://www.torontopearson.com/en/toandfrom/taxilimo/#

An alternative – one young Japanese travelers often use - is public transit. The airport does not make it easy to do this, but it's not that bad. You can find the Toronto Transit Commission (TTC) Airport Rocket (192) on the Ground level of the terminals.

Several buses each hour take you to Kipling Station, on the west end of the subway. You take the subway east to either St. George or Spadina stations (by University of Toronto) or Bloor-Yonge Station.

The fare is \$3 for the whole trip. You will need exact change. During rush hour, it can be as fast as a taxi. But it can be tiring after a long flight. Here are some instructions (http://www.visittorontojp.com/?p=2898).
